SWTCA Labor Day Meeting in Oklahoma City an 'Old Fashioned' Success With a Twist o'New flavor!

The summer heat was record breaking across many parts of the country this year. Nothing new to residents of the Gulf Coast area but in a strange turn of events, the Houston/Gulf Coast metroplex enjoyed an unusually relaxed heat wave and an overwhelming amount of rainfall during the last half of the Summer. Our temps were somewhat below average for the area and we tended to have a mild summer (for Houston) sans the typical drought conditions. This was not the case for most of the rest of the Country and the road trip from



Houston to Oklahoma City (about 500 miles) for the SWTCA Fall Meeting took us through Central and Northern Texas which echoed drought with each passing corn and cotton field. The stark straw colored fields were evidence of a disastrous climax to crops which earlier began as a seed of hope and a harvest for tomorrow. Continuing into Oklahoma the situation became even worse. With each passing of withered fields, the black expanses of fire scorched earth could be seen covering hundreds of acres along the

highway and beyond. The scenic turnouts for the Arbuckle Mountains bore witness to the devastation as much of the typically awe inspiring view now lay blackened and somewhat spoiled. A bit disheartening for sure but the path of devastation and regeneration is a single one and Nature will restore itself and regenerate whenever it is scarred.

It's hard to keep a good trip down though and disaster or not, you are still here and the disaster is out there, the objective is ahead and the mission at hand is to 'head <u>toward</u> the light'. My fellow passenger this trip was Imtiyaz Bangee of 'Kwik Kopy' who is none other than the publisher of our Newsletters here in Houston. We have worked closely together for a year now on publishing techniques etc. and he felt rather drawn enough to our curriculum to join in on a meeting for some fun and some R&R with the added attraction of a road trip through parts of the Country he had yet to see. Originally from Burma, Imtiyaz has resided here for the past 26 years.

Following us to Oklahoma (Friday Evening and Saturday), was some rain and cooler weather. Of course we claimed responsibility for it. I mean....that's just the kind of 'guys' we are down here! Table sales raised a great deal of income as well and in the end, the Club's total outlay was rather minimal. There was no Banquet Dinner this meeting. I truly miss the break, the social hour and the Meeting recap during the Dinner but the savings to members was large and we will likely follow this format again. When Blind Luck's a Lady...

The Canton Flea Market in Texas (First Monday is the correct name) has been around for probably close to a hundred and twenty five years. In bygone days, it was referred to as 'THE' market in the South to hunt for antiques and the legend was correct. Many a story originated from there and when I began tool collecting and even before, those stories made it that much easier to get up at 4:00 A.M. and endure a two hour commute each way with a cup of coffee that you could patch a tire with.

One of the first really exciting encounters I can recall occurred after studying a then recently acquired copy of PTAMPA volume one by Roger Smith. Newly published, I had spent a great deal of time studying the information it offered. It paid off well one clear morning as I spied the unusual profile of an early Bailey Victor Plane some 60 feet or so away on the edge of a table. It had both the front knob and the beautiful rear medallion knob with the Victor Plane lettering so boldly embossed on top. A five dollar bill procured the specimen for my early collection and the value of researching and having a library of information became evident. The thrill of the hunt was born as well.

A few years later (again at Canton), I arrived early enough to catch the dealers just setting up.....at least those that were out of bed! This is where lady luck really holds your hand because the dealers who are actually up are scattered here and there so there is no true systematic approach available. Furthermore, most are in the process of setting up and much they have to offer is still in boxes and unavailable for inspection yet. This means you would do well to return a bit later and make the rounds all over again. But it also means that timing is on your side if something of great interest shows up at the same time you do. This early near dawn morning I ventured to a small group of tables by a large tree just as a dealer was setting out a somewhat crude but early wooden box. When opened, the box revealed the individual parts of a Stanley combination plane. The price on the sticker said \$60.....just about the going price for a decent #45 at that time. Under closer inspection I noticed that the japanning was near mint and the iron parts had only the lightest hint of rust. The blades were few but near mint condition and located in a keeper within the wooden box (which was home made). Even at this early stage of my tool collecting career, the facts were just not adding up and I began to perceive an entirely different picture. The plane was an early Miller patent no.#41 type 2 with duplex arm configuration and a perfect filletster bottom. The tiny stamping in the rosewood handle was perfect as were all 10 blades. The condition was 'unused'. The box was half original.... the top half having been refashioned in a less than competent style! The score of the century for this new collector and a thrill for the chase that still keeps my adrenalin flowing.

I've had many exciting experiences during my tool collecting career......so have you! This column is dedicated to our members so that they may share their fun and excitement with others. Please take advantage of this opportunity and send me some of your special moments to be posted for all of us to enjoy.

The Stanley Little Big Book A Comprehensive Pocket Price Guide for Planes By Clarence Blanchard

This just published little book is a must have for Stanley plane collectors! It's the first in what Clarence Blanchard promises will be an ongoing series of pocket price guides for Stanley tools. The author intends to print one book a year. This first book covers Stanley planes, next year's book will be the remainder of collectible Stanley tools, and in the third year Clarence will do the Stanley planes again with new information and updated prices.

The book lists all of the types of planes made by Stanley over the years and in addition includes planes made by Leonard Bailey both before and after his years with Stanley, as well as the Gage, Siegley, and the Seldon Bailey Defiance planes. The first section of the book is an excellent assessment of the current Stanley market and provides sound advice for both the novice and seasoned collector regarding type studies, condition, and the keys to value. The information about each type of plane with its accompanying photograph is a great help in identification and typing of Stanley planes. While the book doesn't contain all of the various Stanley type studies that have been done, the author does include information regarding major changes for a specific plane.

What I found most interesting about this book is the pricing system used by the author. Three prices are given for most of the tools listed in the book in an effort to truly reflect the condition of tools found in the collectible market. Clarence Blanchard has chosen three values for each plane and listed them in the book. They include "Average

Value" for tools that may not have been well cared for, but have no missing or broken parts. "Median Value" for tools that have been well taken care of despite the fact that they've been used, and "Top Value" for the best condition tools available to the collector. This pricing system does reflect the realities of the tool collecting market and will help the novice and the experienced collector separate the gems from the junk. As the author states, "As long as you buy by condition, sell by condition, and collect by condition, you are headed in the right direction".

At 4 ¾" by 3 ¾" this handy little volume fits neatly in your back pocket so it will be readily available at your favorite flea market or auction. The author has stuffed a lot of very useful information between the covers of this handy book. Anyone who comes in contact with Stanley planes needs to have this book!

Larry Williams (Williams and Clark) Noted for Outstanding Work

EUREKA SPRINGS — Larry Williams makes his living re-creating the past.

He makes traditional-style hand woodworking planes — like those used more than a century ago to create houses such as those found in this historic village of Victorian era structures.

Earlier this year, Williams was designated the 2006 Arkansas Living Treasure by the Arkansas Arts Council and the Department of Arkansas Heritage. This is the fifth year for the groups to recognize someone working in traditional crafts.

Nominated by the Eureka Springs mayor's office, he was one of 24 people nominated from across the state. He was honored at a reception in Eureka Springs earlier this year.

A living treasure is an Arkansan who is outstanding in the creation of a traditional craft, who has elevated the work to the status of art and who actively pursues and advances the art form, according to the arts council.

Joy Pennington, executive director of the Arkansas Arts Council, says Williams stood out for many reasons. "I think it was the combination of the quality of Larry's work and the fact that he's done research internationally," she says. "His work is exquisite."(story continues on www.swtca.com/news)
